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this volume is the result of a conference held at the university of california irvine on the topics that provide its title choice decision and measurement the conference was planned and the volume prepared in honor of professor r duncan luce on his 70th birthday following a short autobiographical statement by luce the volume is organized into four topics to each of which luce has made significant contributions the book provides an overview of current issues in each area and presents some of the best recent theoretical and empirical work personal reflections on luce and his work begin each section these reflections were written by outstanding senior researchers peter fishburn preference and decision making patrick suppes measurement theory and axiomatic systems william j mcgill psychophysics and reaction time and w k estes choice identification and categorization the first section presents recent theoretical and empirical work on descriptive models of decision making and theoretical results on general probabilistic models of choice and ranking luce s recent theoretical and empirical work on rank and sign dependent utility theory is important in many of these contributions the second section presents results from psychophysics probabilistic measurement aggregation of expert opinion and test theory the third section presents various process oriented models with supportive data for tasks such as redundant signal detection forced choice and absolute identification the final section contains theory and data on categorization and attention and general theoretical results for developing and testing models in these domains

at the core of the many debates throughout cognitive science concerning how decisions are made are the processes governing the time course of preference formation and decision from perceptual choices such as whether the signal on a radar screen indicates an enemy missile or a spot on a ct scan indicates a tumor to cognitive value based decisions such as selecting an agreeable flatmate or deciding the guilt of a defendant significant and everyday decisions are dynamic over time phenomena such as decoy effects preference reversals

and order effects are still puzzling researchers for example in a legal context jurors receive discrete pieces of evidence in sequence and must integrate these pieces together to reach a singular verdict from a standard bayesian viewpoint the order in which people receive the evidence should not influence their final decision and yet order effects seem a robust empirical phenomena in many decision contexts current research on how decisions unfold especially in a dynamic environment is advancing our theoretical understanding of decision making this research topic aims to review and further explore the time course of a decision from how prior beliefs are formed to how those beliefs are used and updated over time towards the formation of preferences and choices and post decision processes and effects research literatures encompassing varied approaches to the time scale of decisions will be brought into scope a speeded decisions and post decision processes that require the accumulation of noisy and possibly non stationary perceptual evidence e g randomly moving dots stimuli within a few seconds with or without temporal uncertainty b temporally extended value based decisions that integrate feedback values e g gambling machines and internally generated decision criteria e g when one switches attention selectively between the various aspects of several choice alternatives c temporally extended belief based decisions that build on the integration of evidence which interacts with the decision maker s belief system towards the updating of the beliefs and the formation of judgments and preferences as in the legal context research that emphasizes theoretical concerns including optimality analysis and mechanisms underlying the decision process both neural and cognitive is presented as well as research that combines experimental and computational levels of analysis

researchers studying decision making have traditionally studied the phenomenon in the laboratory with hypothetical decisions that may or may not involve the decision maker s values passions or areas of expertise the assumption is that the findings of these well controlled laboratory studies will shed light on the important decisions people make in their everyday lives this book examines that assumption the volume begins by covering four basic phases of decision making setting or clarifying goals gathering information structuring the decision and making a final choice comprehensive reviews of existing literature on each of these topics is provided next the author examines differences in decision making as a

function of several factors not typically discussed in the literature the type of decision being made e g legal medical moral and the existence of individual differences in the decision maker developmental differences individual differences in style or temperament differences as a function of expertise the author then examines the topic of group decision making contrasting it with individual decision making the volume concludes with some observations and suggestions for improving peoples everyday decision making this book is intended for use as a core textbook or supplement for courses in psychology education or allied disciplines it will also be an invaluable resource for people who work with people making decisions in various applied settings such as schools universities and health care centers

this issue aims to portray justify advance contrast and illustrate research programs in the domain of cognitive decision making under risk and uncertainty where such research programs are intended to promote theories models or conceptual frameworks for prediction of empirical observations descriptions of empirical results likely or rationalized to lead to predictions e g models with free parameters whose values are part of a hypothesis to be tested or cross validation of descriptive model results generalizations of many specific empirical results normative models alternative to expected utility theory eut replications of published results concerning any of the above any of the above may concern any aspect statistic of empirical data including individual or group behavior itself e g prediction of people s actual choices differences or difference in rankings of individual or group behavior distribution of responses for the general purpose of promoting scientific understanding of individual or collective human behavior in the domain of decision making under risk or uncertainty in particular this issue may shed light on the controversy between behavioral economics and cognitive economics the first relates to kahneman and tversky s program of heuristics and biases and the normative model of formal rationality whereas the second is connected to simon gigerenzer and viale s program of simple adaptive heuristics and the normative model of ecological bounded rationality both of which aim to improve economics on a cognitive basis

there are two dominant approaches to political decision making in general and foreign policy decision making in particular rational choice and cognitive psychology the essays here introduce and test the poliheuristic theory of decision making that integrates elements of both schools the poliheuristic theory is able to account for the outcome and the process of decisions and integrates across levels of analysis individual dyad and group the collection focuses on both elements of the theory itself and also looks at how the theory can be used to better understand political decisions that were made in the past

master s thesis from the year 2013 in the subject psychology work business organisation grade 2 3 technical university of munich language english abstract when going for grocery shopping some consumers make up their minds about what to buy and write down shopping lists others just go into the supermarket and do not really think beforehand about the things they need although in both situations individuals engage in different ways of decision making on the purchase of groceries when coming home and putting things into the shelve they positively or negatively assess the things they bought whereas in some situations one gets a positive feeling because e g s he purchased all the products on the shopping list in another situation a consumer might end up being bored because s he just bought the groceries which are perceived as useful and did not listen to his her inner voice calling for more than just the fulfillment of utilitarian needs generally consumers can consciously do their purchases and decide for products after thinking on it or can consider a product s attributes and let their intuition decide in the interest of the consumer the question emerges how the consumer decides at best does a consumer receive greater satisfaction from consciously

elaborating about the products s he is facing or is it better not to think consciously when facing product choices this question is differently assessed by different models on decision making whereas some authors ajzen 2011 bandura 1986 1997 deci ryan 1985 payne et al 1993 emphasize consciousness in decision making there is also a large number of proponents of unconscious thought dijksterhuis 2004 dijksterhuis et al 2005 2006a 2006b 2006c levine 1996 bargh 2002 and wilson et al 1993 dijksterhuis and nordgren 2006b p 96 argue for the superiority of unconscious decision making by mentioning that conscious thought is constrained by the low capacity of consciousness which results in sub optimal choices with regard to food products this general superiority of unconscious thought is highly questionable on the one hand consumers constrain themselves in taking into account only specific products which respect certain criteria as e g with diabetics and food products with less sugar content on the other hand food products are also bought because consumers want to confirm their conscience by purchasing e g fair trade products which among other things are associated with a fair payment of farmers
